1	Welcome and Introductions NW welcomed everyone to the meeting. In attendance: NW, BH, SM, RW, JW, FH, JH, NS, MS, JL, SB, JW, JF, ML, NH, DG, KH, LR, CE, BA, MB, RB, NR	
	NW noted that PSO Amanda Morelli had been invited but was unable to attend. However Bev Wilson from Neighbourhood Watch was present and would be able to give an update.	
	NW also introduced Councillor John Taylor to the meeting.

3	Minutes of the last meeting (2 July 2025) were approved and seconded.	
4	Matters Arising (not on the Agenda) There were none.	
5	Represent the interests and concerns of village residents to the local authorities and other stakeholders	
	• Council updates BA said that August had not been a busy time because of holidays. KMBC continued to be cautious about spending although there were some signs that there was a relaxation on recruitment. It continued to be difficult to get things done and the legal requirements took priority. BA said that KMBC had condemned all concrete lamp posts because of safety issues and would not allow hanging baskets. However alternative lamps could be identified and these would be used in future. NW asked the Garden Gang to pick up this action. JT said that more money was being put into cleaning up in Kirklees including overgrown vegetation, footpaths, damaged signs etc. Also an additional £100k had been made available for the team who managed fly tipping. Three areas where footpaths have disappeared are being restored. So progress was happening albeit slowly. There was a discussion on fly tipping which was felt to be on the increase. It was suggested this may be because waste tips had more restricted opening times.	Garden gang members to suggest alternative posts for hanging baskets
	RB gave an update on Kirkburton Parish Council. Again this was a quiet time. There had been an audit at the council's request. Applications for small grants (up to £300) were now open for community groups.	

Place Standards

JT gave an overview on this initiative which is a way of gathering views about local areas and capturing the thoughts of residents and converting them into actions. It involves asking residents about 12 aspects of life including moving around, public transport, traffic and parking, streets and spaces, natural space, play and recreation, facilities and amenities, work and local economy, social contact, identity and belonging, feeling safe, care and maintenance and influence and sense of control.

The scores show how well each area is performing and translates to an action plan to make improvements. It also captures what people say and the council staff will work in the village for 3 weeks or so with the support of the community group. KBMC will take the outcomes into account when making decisions. JT noted that the next Kirklees local plan was about to be drafted.

The next steps would be to involve local officers, produce posters, deliver leaflets to households etc. BW confirmed her positive experience of Place Standards and encouraged participation. There were links with Neighbourhood Watch.

FH said that a similar exercise had been undertaken around 19 years ago and a local community plan produced. It was felt that this would be a useful comparison for current issues.

NW said he was supportive for various reasons including the opportunity to get a more representative view. JT said the process included going to places to meet people rather than asking then to attend meetings. This would allow us to reframe our objectives and underpin decisions. JT confirmed that a sensitive and well planned approach would be used particularly when communicating with vulnerable people.

Traffic Calming

NW gave a review of the position. Following a visit from staff from the Highways department where some recommendations were made a local group was formed but very little progress has been made. JT was now involved and had walked around the village. The local MP, Jade Botterill, had met with the group. She had been very receptive to concerns and will lobby on our behalf. NW said we need to generate as much evidence as possible to support our case.

JA said the criteria for KMBC action had been relaxed. JT said that several videos of traffic speeding in the village had been shared with police. Videos also showed that only 1 side of Butts Lane is being gritted. It was reported that both sides should be gritted and awareness has been raised.

One suggestion that the FTCG has been trying to action is entrance markers to the village. It has now been confirmed that planning permission for these is not required providing Highways staff do the work. The group would pay for this to be done. JT said he would ask the Highways department to work at our expense. There was also a discussion about changing speed limits. Previously the FTCG had been informed that this was not possible but that seems to be not the case.

	BW provided the meeting with an overview of her role within the Neighbourhood Watch. She and a PCSO had been invited following a number of break ins and concerns in the village. She was able to confirm that a suspect had been arrested. BW asked anyone who sees any suspicious activity to report this online or through 111.	
	BW provided data on recent reports and said that anyone wishing to be included in neighbourhood watch alerts should ask for their name to be added to the list. NW asked for details to be put on the FTCG website.	
	BW said that the crime reports included descriptions of what had happened so people can be more alert and aware of what to look out for. For example she had noticed an increase in thefts from car-top boxes this month. Further details are on the Neighbourhood Watch website. Some equipment such as window vibrator alarms are also available and new neighbourhood watch posters were distributed.	
	NW thanked BW for attending and fro her valuable contribution to the discussion.
